# Circuit Court Rules FRS Changes are "Unconstitutional"

he courtroom was packed with attorneys, members of the media and representatives from the State, the Teachers' union, the Florida PBA and the Firefighters' union. Everyone was wait-

ing for Judge Jackie Fulford to make her entrance and announce her decision on the constitutionality of the July 1, 2011 changes to the Florida Retirement System. Promptly at 2:00 p.m. on March 6, 2012, Judge Fulford entered the courtroom and assumed her position behind the bench.

Judge Fulford found the revisions to FRS law to be an unconstitutional breach of contract, an unconstitutional taking, and, finally, an unconstitutional breach of the right to collective bargaining. The Plaintiffs (represented by the Teachers' union) and Intervenors, John Park and Randall Haire (represented by the PBA) had alleged these three grounds as reasons

to overturn FRS revisions and moved for summary judgment on the stated grounds. Motion granted: the revisions were unconstitutional on all three grounds.

> By 4:30 p.m., the State had filed its appeal of the decision. So Judge Fulford's decision is "stayed" (stopped) while the decision is appealed. But it is still on the books and the Florida PBA will work hard to make sure it stays on the books!

> On March 12, 2012, counsel for the Plaintiffs and Intervenors filed a motion with the district

court trying to have the case passed directly to the Florida Supreme Court for immediate review. On Friday, March 16, 2012, the District Court ruled in favor of our motion... so it's off to the Supreme Court for a final ruling.

He was formerly a Metro-Dade police officer and a Major with the Martin County Sheriff's Office. If you review Representative Snyder's resumé, it is clear that he is the best candidate for Martin County Sheriff.

Good luck to everyone and we will keep you updated as we get closer to the elections. Please remember, we have to get involved in this year's elections. # Officer Of The Month

Officers of the Month - August 2011
Boynton Beach Officers Vinicius Melo, Henry Diehl,
Thomas Murphy, Michael Brown and Ronald Ryan

On August 15, 2011, Officer Melo located a vehicle involved in five (5) Delray Beach armed robberies and a car jacking. Melo attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle did not stop and was stop sticked by Officer Ryan striking the vehicle's right front tire. A vehicle pursuit was authorized with Officers Brown, Diehl, Murphy and Melo involved due to the nature of the offenses and the number of subjects in the vehicle. Ultimately, the vehicle was stopped and the occupants attempted a bail-out after hitting a palm tree. The suspects were apprehended by Boynton Beach Police Department K-9, Delray K-9 and Boynton Beach Police Officers. The suspects were arrested by Delray Beach Police Department for multiple armed robberies and car jacking. The suspects subsequently confessed to Delray Beach Detectives. Officer Melo spotted the wanted felons; Officer Ryan was able to successfully deploy and recover the stop sticks; Officers Brown, Murphy, Melo, and Diehl were able to conduct an outstanding vehicle pursuit. All of the officers actions are examples of outstanding police work.

#### Officer of the Month - September 2011 Boynton Beach Officer Jason Llopis

On Wednesday, October 26, 2011, there was a high speed multi-agency chase that ended in the capture of the suspect on Federal Highway in front of the Lantana Town Square. A call had gone out that the suspect had just shot another individual at the Home Depot parking lot in Boynton Beach. The caller indicated the man who fired shots got into a white Chevy van and drove away at a high rate of speed in excess of 100 mph northbound on I-95. The van crashed into two (2) vehicles on I-95 before exiting on Lantana Road going towards Federal Highway where it turns south. The vehicle was stopped on Federal Highway. Boynton Beach Police Detective Jason Llopis saw the driver of the van was holding a hand gun to his own head. Detective Llopis gave commands to drop the gun and show me your hands without any cover to protect himself. The suspect put his hands down out of

view and came up again with the gun still in his hand this time pointed directly to Detective Llopis. Detective Llopis yelled several times to drop the gun and show me your hands.

The suspect would not comply and Detective Llopis shot three (3) to four (4) rounds stopping the threat, saving our citizens, and ultimately charged the suspect with homicide and aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer.

# Officers of the Month - October 2011 PBSO Deputies Fraser Austin and Ryan Reza

On October 25, 2011, Palm Beach County Deputies Reza and Austin responded to South Federal Highway in reference to a disturbance. On their arrival, they heard a loud noise coming from inside the apartment. The Deputies knocked and announced their presence and moments later a male opened the door irate and angry. Deputy Reza observed the male holding a large knife in his left hand that Deputy Austin could not see from his position. The man was wielding the knife at the deputies above his head in a threatening fashion. Deputy Austin fired his taser and struck the suspect in his left hand, but it was not effective. With the knife raised, the suspect moved towards Deputy Austin in an aggressive manner. Deputy Reza reacted to this aggression and fired his firearm at the subject stopping the threat and killing the suspect. If it were not for the courageous and unhesitating responses of both Deputy Reza and Deputy Austin, the suspect could have gained control of the situation, used the knife to cause injury or death to those at the scene.

#### Officer of the Month - November 2011 PBSO D/S Eric Bethel

On November 12, 2011, Deputies were called out pursuant to a 911 home invasion call with multiple suspects falsely posing as law enforcement officers with fraudulent badges. The suspects would bang on the citizen's door posing as police officers, all armed and wearing masks. At the scene, PBSO Deputy Eric Bethel confronted two (2) suspects as they left the occupied dwelling wearing handkerchiefs over their faces and all dark clothing. During the foot chase, one of the suspects reached for his waist band as Deputy Bethel shouted

multiple times "Sheriff's Office, show me your hands." The suspect reached farther into his waist band and Deputy Bethel shot one round missing the suspect. The suspect then entered a vehicle's driver seat and revved the engine. Both Deputies Bethel and Kaczor yelled "Sheriff's Office, stop the car," and both drew down on the suspect. The suspect put the car in gear practically at Deputy Kaczor. Fearing for the life of

Deputy Kaczor, Deputy Bethel shot one round into the driver side door. Deputy Bethel not only potentially saved the life of Deputy Kaczor and himself, but of potentially multiple Palm Beach County citizens because of his courage.

#### Officer of the Month - December 2011 MCSO Det. Leo Ferreira

On December 8, 2011, the suspect entered the Wells Fargo Bank in Jensen Beach, Martin County. The suspect was wearing a mask, camouflage clothing, a military pistol belt and had a large military type back pack. The suspect told

bank employees that this was a robbery and demanded money. The suspect had a concealed object that bank employees took to be a hand gun or other deadly weapon. A 911 call was placed. The 911 dispatchers could hear the suspect yelling at bank employees to put up their hands and hand him money. Detective Ferreira was in the bank parking lot when the robbery call went out over the radio. Alone, Detective Ferreira saw and heard the suspect yelling at bank employees and took the suspect to the ground, whereby a fight ensued and the suspect continued to resist arrest. The suspect was finally subdued and handcuffed. Detective Ferreira is to be commended on his quick apprehension of a dangerous suspect and for his keen detective skills.

# Careful, Big Brother Has a Facebook Account

ou may have read or heard about a book that was written in 1948 by George Orwell titled "1984." The book was a fictional account of a time (1984), when the government would subject people to 24 hour surveillance in order to ensure their allegiances. Well, things aren't quite that bad, but as government employees, your activities are scrutinized and second-guessed by your employer as well as the citizenry that you protect. With the advent of social media, we have become an increasingly more public society. Our casual thoughts and mundane movements are broadcast across the internet for anyone within our network to see. The lines created between work life and private life are blurred and the crossover can create problems if your employer takes issue with your daily public rants.

The question most asked is whether your employer can discipline you for your public speech? Supreme Court Justice

Oliver Wendell Holmes wrote in 1892, "There may be a constitutional right to talk politics, but there is no constitutional right to be a policeman." While that statement is fundamentally true, in that as a public employee you have some diminished rights, the law has "carved out" the circumstances where you may speak freely. Over the years, the case law has been interpreted to prohibit a government employer from taking an adverse employment action against a public employee for speech

relating to matters of public concern. The issue for the majority of the cases is whether the employee was speaking on behalf of themselves, or on behalf of the public as a citizen.

The Unites States Supreme Court ruled in (a preeminent case involving speech) <u>Garcetti v Cebellos</u>, "[w]hen employees make statements pursuant to their official duties, the employee's are not speaking as citizens for First Amendment purposes, and the Constitution does not insulate their communications from employer discipline."

In <u>Garcetti</u>, a district attorney was disciplined for writing a memorandum recommending the dismissal of a case. In the memo, Cebellos claimed that there was misconduct in obtaining a search warrant. The District Attorney's Office, nonetheless, proceeded with the prosecution of the case. Cebellos was disciplined and filed an action premised on his First Amendment rights. The Ninth Circuit ruled in favor of Cebellos and the Supreme Court reversed, stating that Cebellos was writing pursuant to his job as a district attorney and therefore his

speech was subject to discipline from his employer. In other words, if your speech occurs within the scope of your employment, it might not be protected.

The law does protect you if your writing is "concerted activity." Concerted activity is activity which seeks to benefit not just the writer (employee), but also fellow employees. The Florida Public Employee Relations Commission (PERC) has held that when an employee engages in activities for his benefit alone, such conduct is not concerted, and thus, not protected.

In <u>Dickey v Hillsborough County</u>, the 2nd District of Court of Appeals in Florida affirmed a PERC decision holding that an employer could not discipline a deputy (and PBA Local President) for a blog that was posted on the PBA website. The corrections deputy's "speech" was posted on the PBA website during contract negotiations. Corporal Dickey made several

posts on the website that addressed the Chief Deputy by his nickname. The posts included statements that the Chief Deputy made uninformed statements and didn't attend contract talks. After the Sheriff suspended the Corporal, the union brought an unfair labor practice charge. PERC determined that the Corporal's speech remained protected even though it disparaged and belittled the Chief Deputy.

But wait... there's more! Even if the speech is made as a citizen, the court applies a balancing test to determine if the interest of the employee in speaking on matters of public concern are greater than the agency's interest in promoting the efficiency of the public service the agency provides.<sup>1</sup>

The moral of the story – When posting on Facebook or other social mediums follow some common sense rules:

- 1. As best as possible don't indicate your affiliation with the agency when networking.
- 2. Don't post photographs that are taken on department property and/or while in uniform or work assignments.
- 3. Don't use social networking websites, blogs, Twitter, or other social medium when you are on duty.
- 4. Don't post confidential or sensitive information or photographs of work activity.
- 5. Most importantly, remember Big Brother IS watching.

## The Grievance Process

he word "grievance" automatically conjures up something negative: a complaint, a gripe, or an injustice, either perceived or real. Also, the process itself can come under social or political fire.

The ability to grieve, however, is paramount. In many instances, the grievance is completely valid. It is vital that we, as employees, have some sort of recourse. For it to be any other way, the process may not be considered fair.

The PBA Grievance and Arbitration procedure is described as a... "dispute over the interpretation or application of the specific provisions of this Agreement" ("Agreement" is the Collective Bargaining Agreement).

Bargaining unit members have the right to appeal suspensions (greater than two [2] days), demotions or discharges, and other employment related actions, by following the procedure outlined in the "Grievance and Arbitration Procedure." This process is available to all bargaining unit members regardless of membership in the PBA. However, any costs such as the arbitrator's fee, transcripts, or other items of cost, associated with a grievance by a non-member will require no less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000) posted in advance.

#### Step 1

Present a written grievance to your Captain/DM within ten (10) working days of the occurrence. The Captain/DM has ten (10) working days to respond.

#### Step 2

If there is no resolution in Step 1, the employee may appeal to the Major/Director, in writing, within ten (10) working days of the date the response was due, according to Step 1.

#### Step 3

If there is no resolution in Step 2, the employee may appeal to the Colonel/Director, in writing, within ten (10) working days of the date the response was due, according to Step 2.

#### Step 4

If there is no resolution in Step 3, the employee may appeal to the Sheriff, or his designee, in writing, within ten (10) working days of the date the response was due, according to Step 3.

The time limits in these steps may be waived by mutual agreement (BOTH) of the parties, in writing. If the employee/PBA fails to properly advance a grievance, it will be considered withdrawn with prejudice. If PBSO fails to properly advance a grievance, it will be considered denied, effective on the date the response was due for that particular step.

The process does not restrict the employees' access to the services of the PBA. It is important to contact a representative at the outset of a potentially grievable issue. Your Representative can provide guidance with initiating the process, and arranging proper support for the employee. Should a grievance focus on the action/inaction of a management person not indicated in Step 1, the employee may bring the grievance to the next appropriate management level. In any case, the employee should contact a representative with a concern, even though the employee may not be sure that it is an employment related issue.

Many issues brought this way have ultimately become CONTRACT issues handled at the bargaining table and then memorialized in a final Collective Bargaining Agreement.

# Arizona Republicans Quickly Pushing Anti-Union Bills Through Legislature

abor unions plan to rally in front of the Arizona State Capitol on Thursday afternoon to protest four bills quickly moving through the state Legislature that could make last year's Wisconsin labor laws look modest by comparison.

Three of the four bills restrict the way unions collect dues and the way workers get paid for union activities. The fourth bans collective bargaining between governments and government workers: state and local. Unlike Wisconsin, it affects all government employees, including police and firefighters.

"It seems as though those employees or at least the unions that represent them don't care what the burden is on the taxpayer as long as they get theirs," says state Sen. Rick Murphy, a Republican who is sponsoring the bills.

Murphy says collective bargaining lets public workers put themselves ahead of the public they are working for.

Nick Dranias of the Phoenix-based Goldwater Institute, a libertarian/conservative think tank that helped Murphy write the bills, says public-sector workers in Arizona make about 6% more in salary and benefits than their private-sector counterparts.

"You're not in government, you know, to collect a fat paycheck," Dranias says. "You're in government to serve. And if you get paid reasonably, that's nice, but the moment you feel the need to organize collectively and create laws like collective-bargaining laws that give you special privileges to negotiate and extract compensation not seen in the private sector, you've gone too far."

Arizona is also different from Wisconsin in that it's a right-to-work state: No one can be forced to join a union. So unions in Arizona already have less clout. Still, 80% of police in the state choose to belong to a union.

Brian Livingston, who represents the Arizona Police Association, which is fighting the bills, says police and firefighters typically get paid less in salary, but he acknowledges that they negotiate better benefits and retirement plans. Livingston says police deserve it. "By the time we retire, we know that most of us will not live beyond what the average private citizen does," he says. "And I'm speaking specifically about public safety, the rigors of our occupation, the hazards of our occupation take a lifelong toll on our longevity."

Democrats in the Arizona Legislature are outnumbered by Republicans 2-to-1 in the House and by more in the Senate.

Senate Minority Leader David Schapira says he is appalled by the bills.

"These bills are clearly the most anti-worker, anti-middle class, anti-union bills in the history of the country," he says.

Schapira says the bills are purely political. They're being considered, he says, because union leaders tend to support Democrats over Republicans.

"These are people that the Tea Party leadership at the State Capitol in Arizona disagree with, and so they're punishing them and that's the purpose of these pieces of legislation," he says.

Murphy, the bill's sponsor, acknowledges that public worker labor unions are a political problem for him. The elected officials labor leaders are negotiating with, he says, are afraid to give in to unions for fear of political reprisal.

"When the unions are the ones who are disproportionately influencing those elected officials, the elected officials are very rarely on the side of the taxpayers in those negotiations," he says

The swiftness of this new attempt at cutting the power of public worker unions took labor leaders by surprise. The bills were introduced just last week, passed through committee and are ready for a full Senate vote.

reetings and warmest wishes in the New Year! Wow, 2011 is over. What a year! First, I want to thank all of you who serve and provide service to the community. You have done an amazing job in a very difficult time. Second, to our fellow agencies in Palm Beach County and around the state, thank you for all you do in your communities to keep them safe! Finally, to the families of those who have given the ultimate gift to the community, please know we all share in your continuing grief. Please be aware that we continue to work day in, day out, to keep your loved ones alive in our hearts.

Last year was a busy year for the PBSO PBA. We recruited the civilian members to petition for union representation and won the right to be their collective bargaining unit. This is a first for us, the county and the state PBA. To be sure, there are civilians represented, but not as a whole, large, independent unit! Congratulations to all, and welcome to the Palm Beach County Police Benevolent Association!

As I have done in the past, I will give you an update on PBA activity in the last year. As always, I will not provide direct details, but rather an overview of what has happened.

For the total, the PBA, through our attorneys, filed 12 Grievances/HRB/TRB's, winning several (more in a moment), attended 43 Internal Affairs interviews, 24 Personnel Complaint interviews, and 7 critical incidents. This alone has kept them busy. Additionally, many questions come in to the office on a regular basis, and of course, the Reps answer many more throughout the year.

Regarding the Grievances, we won a major case this year against PBSO. I am not attempting to rub the nose of the administration, I simply want you, the member, to be aware of this process. Remember, the PBA will file a grievance with the command in question, who has to review and determine if the issue can be resolved. If it cannot be resolved by the affected employee and their command, it goes up the chain, ultimately reaching the Sheriff for final disposition. If the PBA feels the decision by the Sheriff is within reason, the grievance is final. If the PBA feels the issue will impact our 'rights, benefits or terms of employment' then we will file for arbitration (a very costly and

time consuming process). In this way, a hearing is held in front of an Arbitration, who takes testimony and hears evidence before rendering a decision after post arbitration briefs are submitted. At this point, both parties can accept the decision or file a motion with the Circuit Court to have the decision vacated.

This year, the PBA filed a case that had major implications for all members of the PBSO. After the process of grievance and arbitration, the case was appealed to the 15th Judicial Circuit Court and the arbitrator's decision, in favor of the PBA, was upheld! This was done for the benefit of ALL PBSO PBA members, not just the one in

It is my understanding that this report is made for administrative, internal police department purposes only. This report is made by me after being ordered to do so by lawful supervisory officers. I have not been permitted a reasonable amount of time to confer with a PBA representative or attorney. It is my understanding that by refusing to obey an order to write this immediately, that I can be disciplined for insubordination and that the punishment for insubordination can be up to, and including, termination of employment. This report is made only pursuant to such orders and the potential punishment/discipline that can result for failure to obey that order.

# **Negativity In The Workplace**

e all have issues and problems in our lives, and often find it comforting to seek the advice of a trusted friend or colleague. And sometimes, we become that trusted friend or colleague. But how quickly things can deteriorate when an individual we've tried to help just won't let go; when that person's problems, either real or perceived, become so pervasive that they become a nuisance, and a negative influence in your life, and possibly the lives of your co-workers.

Let's face it, some people are just unhappy and nothing you can say or do is going to change that.

It can be exhausting listening to frequent "venting," and trying not to let that negativity affect your own behavior and morale. Here are just a few suggestions to help limit the negativity, and prevent it from becoming a major problem.

1. Don't let their "situations" take up too much of your time—when you give attention to minor complaints, you throw fuel on the fire, possibly opening up the floodgates for every grievance imaginable. Respond, but don't spend more than a few minutes each day with such a person.

- 2. Try to re-focus the conversation on what that person DOES have. Everyone has *something* to be happy about
- Avoid "losing it"—it is imperative that you remain calm and professional throughout. You don't want to lose credibility, and you certainly don't want to count yourself as yet another negative in that person's eyes.
- 4. Dispel any rumors immediately—complaining or stating an opinion is one thing. Spreading an untruth is quite another. If you encounter any rumors or any unsubstantiated comments, react quickly. GO TO THE SOURCE and ask for an explanation/clarification before making your own determination.

Remember that it is far more likely that the negative person will have an adverse effect on you, than you, as a more positive person, will have on them. STAY FOCUSED on what you are supposed to be doing, and remember to embrace the things that you DO have. The negative person will soon become bored with you and move on to another victim.

# Fire Safety – It Involves Everyone

according to the United States Fire Administration (USFA) statistics, there were 362,000 fires in 2010 across the United States. The statistics show that there were 2,555 fatalities and 13,275 injuries due to fire with a dollar loss staggering at \$6.6 billion. I am often asked about what people can do to make themselves safe against fires. Here are a few tips to keep you, your family and your possessions safe. These tips include using common sense and a few things you might not have known.

- 1. Unattended Cooking—According to statistics from USFA, the #1 cause of fires in the U.S. is due to unattended cooking. A staggering 60% of all fires occur in the kitchen and are a result of leaving something on the stove. If you are cooking, make sure that you stay with it at all times. Do not get distracted by the phone, kids, or neighbors. If you are called away, remove the item from the heat source.
- 2. Candles—We all use candles in our homes and offices every day. They smell really nice and mask most odors. They come in all shapes and sizes. However, if you use a candle, make sure that it is away from any other item. Make sure you extinguish it, before leaving the room and make sure that it is out. Never burn a candle in the bedroom.
- 3. Smoke Detectors—We have always been taught that smoke detectors save lives. They do. Make sure you have smoke detectors in your home or office. Test them every month and change the batteries when you change your clocks. According to the USFA, more people die each year from smoke inhalation than from burns. Early warning is the best defense when it comes to a fire.
- 4. Extension Cords—Electrical extension cords can be found everywhere. We use them in our homes and in our offices. Extension cords should not be used in place of fixed wiring and in-fact, it is a violation of the fire code. The cords are constructed with a polyvinyl insulation that covers the wires. The purpose of the insulation is to dissipate the heat away from the wires. When cords are wrapped around table legs, covered with rugs, the insulation can't do its job. Do not bundle the cords and allow air to flow around the cord and insulation.
- 5. Overloaded Circuits—We have a tendency to plug all the electronic items into a receptacle or device. If it's got six slots, we fill all the slots. The devices are not manufactured to work this way. We tend to overload the circuit and then when there is a fire, we wonder why it happened. Electrical receptacles, wires, and extension cords are not meant to be overloaded. Spread the electronic devices around to different circuits in a room or get a licensed electrician to come in and run separate circuits.
- 6. Relocatable Power Taps (RPTs) a.k.a. Surge Protectors— These devices come in handy when using expensive electronic equipment like televisions, surround sound systems and the like. However, care should be used when utilizing

- these types of devices. Most RPTs are good and reliable. Some have been recalled due to manufacturer defects. When using these devices, make sure you do not overload them. Just like extension cords, make sure that the cords are not wrapped up and bundled. The better and more expensive RPTs have an individual circuit breaker in them to prevent overheating and overloading.
- 7. Smoking—It's a bad habit and you have heard that you should quit. Well, you should. But if you must smoke, make sure that you deposit the butts into an approved ashtray. Make sure the butts are out before emptying the ashtray into a garbage can. And whatever you do, don't smoke in bed!
- 8. Maintenance—Make sure that you keep up the maintenance schedule on all your vehicles including your patrol car and personal car. Wear and tear on our vehicles causes things to shift and become loose. Loose contacts around the battery can cause arcs and sparks to occur. This is a bad thing when you have arcs and sparks around flammable fluids like brake fluid, transmission fluid, motor oil, and gasoline. The main ingredient in most windshield wiper fluids is alcohol and it is very flammable. Check the recalls on your vehicle and ensure that all the items are working as they were meant to. You can check recalls at <a href="https://www.recalls.gov">www.recalls.gov</a>.
- 9. Household products—Most household consumer products we use are basically safe. The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission ensures that products meet or exceed the U.S. standards. Along with companies like Underwriter Laboratories (UL) consumer products are tested to make sure that they do not create fire hazards. However, from time to time, these products do fail and recalls are issued. A good tip is to unplug any device when it's not being used. Recalls of consumer products can be checked through <a href="https://www.recalls.gov">www.recalls.gov</a> and <a href="https://www.recalls.gov">www.cspc.gov</a>
- 10. Fire Drills—How many times as a kid did you have to do fire drills at school? Do you have fire drills at home? Do you have an escape plan or a meeting place outside of your home or office? As adults, these are just as important. If you have a fire in your home, your family will be your primary concern. Discuss with your family members how to get out of your home and where to meet once outside. Too many times, we have seen family members going back into a home looking for family, only to find out they had gotten out and went to a neighbor's house. Make sure everyone at the home knows what to do and where to go. Get out and stay out.

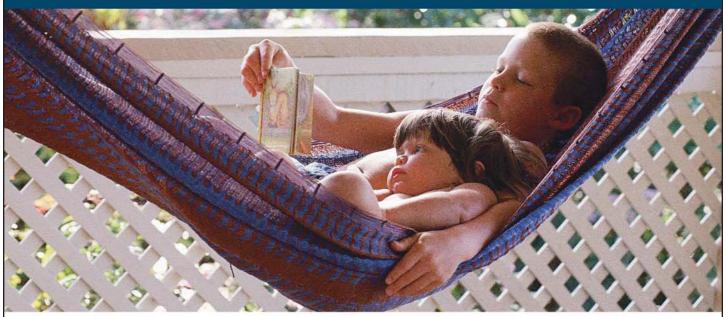

- ✓ to be represented by a PBA **attorney** during any interrogation;
- ✓ to be provided any complaint, all witness statements, and all existing evidence (e.g., audio and video recordings, GPS locator information) for review **with an attorney before** the beginning of any interrogation;
- ✓ to be interrogated at a reasonable hour (e.g., at a time when a PBA attorney can be present for the review and interrogation);



- ✓ to refuse a polygraph, and
- ✓ to refuse to respond to questions if an investigator intentionally fails to comply with requested requirements after being advised of his or her violations of those requirements.

As a dues-paying member, a Palm Beach County PBA attorney can be with you every step of the way.

To the extent that such lawsuits may be brought against you <u>after</u> you retire, you need to consider continuing your membership for four (4) years beyond your retirement.

If you are retired but have returned to law enforcement and are currently paying a "RETIREE MEMBER-SHIP," you should be aware that if you are subject to such actions at a time when you no longer are paying the appropriate dues, the PBA cannot provide legal assistance. See Palm Beach County Policy 12-1.

Enjoy the full peace of mind your retirement should mean.

## REMINDER

The legal defense policies of the Florida and Palm Beach County PBA have an important provision regarding representation. If a member elects to secure representation by anyone other than the PBA (a private attorney, for example) that member is considered to have waived representation by the PBA. Once this happens, it is the PBA's option whether or not to continue to represent the member in that matter. Please call the PBA office if you have any questions regarding this policy.

# 817.311 UNLAWFUL USE OF BADGES, ETC.

(1) (817.311 SS)From and after May 9, 1949, any person who shall wear or display a badge, button, insignia or other emblem, or shall use the name of or claim to be a member of any benevolent, fraternal, social, humane, or charitable organization, which organization is entitled to the exclusive use of such name and such badge, button, insignia or emblem either in the identical form or in such near resemblance thereto as to be a colorable imitation thereof, unless such person is entitled so to do under the laws, rules and regulations of such organization, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in S. 775.082 or S. 775.083.

(2) This section shall be cumulative to any and all laws now in force in the state.

Florida Statutes (1987).

### **PLEASE NOTE**

843.085 Unlawful Use of police badges or other indicia of authority: (l) Unless appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter 354, authorized by the appropriate agency, or displayed in a closed or mounted case as a collection or exhibit, to wear or display any authorized indicia of authority, including any badge, insignia, emblem, identification card, or uniform, or any colorable imitation thereof, of any federal, state, county, or municipal law enforcement agency, or other criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in S. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it, or which displays in any manner or combination the word or words "police," "patrolman," "agent," "sheriff," "deputy," "trooper," "highway patrol," "Wildlife Officer," "Marine Patrol Officer," "state attorney," "public defender," "marshal," "constable," or "bailiff," which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it.

(2) To own or operate a motor vehicle marked or identified in any manner or combination by the word or words "police," (etc.) Or by any lettering, marking, or insignia, or colorable imitation thereof, including but not limited to, stars, badges, or shields, officially used to identify the vehicle as a federal, state, county or municipal law enforcement vehicle or a vehicle used by a criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in s. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such vehicle is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person operating the motor vehicle, unless such vehicle is owned or operated by the appropriate agency and its use is authorized by such agency, or the local law enforcement agency authorizes the use of such vehicle or unless the person is appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter 354

(3) To sell, transfer, or give away the authorized badge or colorable imitation thereof, including miniatures of any  $\dots$ 

(4) NOTHING IN THIS SECTION SHALL PROHIBIT A FRATERNAL, BENEVOLENT, OR LABOR ORGANIZATION OR ASSOCIATION, OR THEIR CHAPTERS OR SUBSIDIARIES, FROM USING THE FOLLOWING WORDS, IN ANY MANNER OR IN ANY COMBINATION, IF THOSE WORDS APPEAR IN THE OFFICIAL NAME OF THE ORGANIZATIONS OR ASSOCIATIONS.

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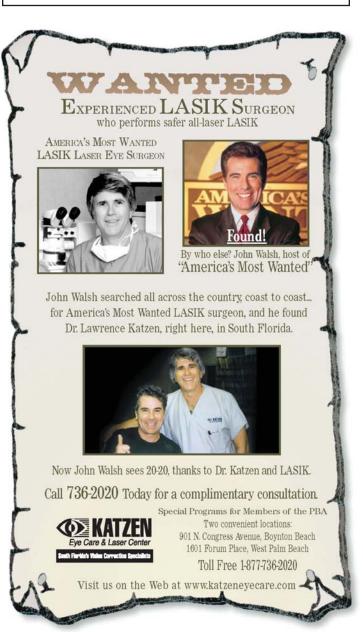


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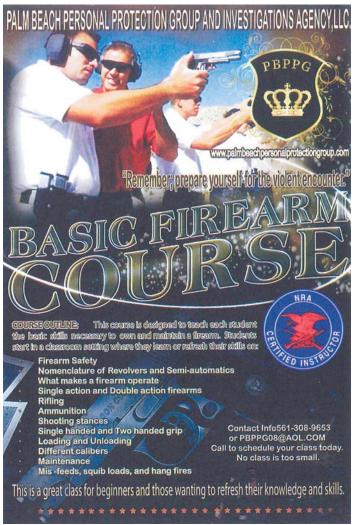
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Twenty dollars of the proceeds from the tag will be deposited into a charitable fund, the **Florida PBA Heart Fund**, for the Association's members.

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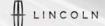
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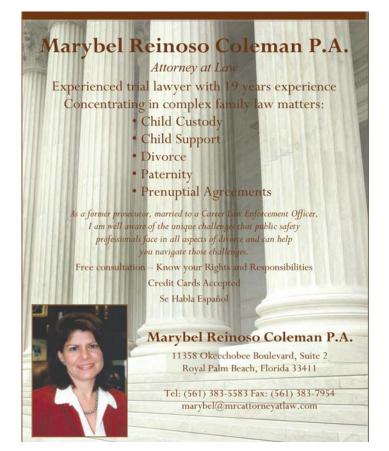
