President's Message

irst and foremost, our hearts go out to the Rosenthal family, who lost Adam to a tragic automobile accident. He leaves behind a wife and four children. I recently visited Adam's wife, Joanne, and gave her \$32,000 out of the PBA Charity Fund because Adam died while on duty. I also reassured her anything that the PBA can do, we will do, and to not hesitate to call; we will be there. Adam also served as a member of the Board of Directors for Palm Beach County PBA. Adam did a great job while serving as a Representative, well respected and well liked. Joanne and the kids are going to need a lot of help just to get by, so let's keep them in our prayers.

Thank goodness this legislative session is over. Believe it or not, it was not as bad as it started out to be. At the very beginning, Governor Scott was asking the Legislature to have all FRS participants contribute 6%: well, thank goodness that didn't happen. When it was all said and done, the Senate and the House decided we have to contribute 3%. The House bill had the DROP gone. The Senate still had it in. When both the House and the Senate went to conference, we called on Representative Snyder. I was in contact with him daily whether meeting in person or speaking with him on the phone. He assured me he would meet with the House leadership and work on getting it back. Well, he did get it back for us; it did change just a bit, but it is still there. If you DROP after July 1, 2011 the interest you receive on your DROP account has been reduced from 6.5% to 1.3%. You can still sell back up to 500 hours of vacation prior to going into the DROP. For FRS members, the legislators did suspend the COLA for five years. Best example is: if a member retires two years from now and has 25 years vested in the FRS, his or her COLA will be 2.76% instead of 3%. You are probably saying, "how did I come up with the 2.76%?" Here's how: take 23/25=0.92x3=2.76. The 23 is the years you worked prior to July 1st 2011, the 25 is the years you worked. The three is the COLA we are currently receiving. I know it sounds confusing. If anyone has any questions, call the office and we will explain. The lowest the COLA will be is 2.4, and that is for members who have 20 years of service or less.

For the municipalities, the legislators started out taking the 185 money. Thank goodness that didn't happen. But they did change the cap of overtime that can be used towards your pension. It now reads that your city or town MAY let you cap 300 hours of overtime. NOT GOOD.

This is why next elections, you all have to GET OUT AND VOTE and be extremely active. Who knows what Governor Scott wants to do next year to public employees, but I am sure it will not be in our best interest. I hope all have a safe and great summer.

Officer Of The Month

Officer of the Month - December 2010 PBSO Detective James Evans

From April to June, 2010, a group of violent criminals committed multiple home invasions, street-level robberies, attempted murders of three (3) law enforcement officers, three (3) murders of Palm Beach County citizens and multiple on-going other Felonies.

Detective James Evans spearheaded the "Cops and Robbers" investigation in an effort to resolve the recent "Circle K" double-homicides in Palm Beach County. Detective Evans used superior detective skills to gain the cooperation of an alleged gang member and arms dealer, resulting in multiple arrests. Detective Evans worked feverishly using extensive investigative skills to procure a confession that resulted in a Palm Beach County Grand Jury issuing a "True Bill" for two (2) counts of 1st Degree Murder on individuals specifically relating to the deaths of two (2) Circle-K convenience store clerks. Detective Evans ultimately prepared a RICO case that included eight (8) subjects.

He canceled his own personal vacations and otherwise put his life on hold to work with attorneys and supervisors to convey his personal understanding of the cases to reach a successful result. He is more than a credit to his badge.

INTERNET SOCIAL NETWORKING SITES: POTENTIALLY "ANTI-SOCIAL" FOR POLICE OFFICERS i.e., THINK BEFORE YOU POST

recent *New York Times* ("NYT") article discussed how Albuquerque Police Officer Trey Economidy now recognizes that he should have given greater thought before listing his occupation on his FacebookTM profile as "Human Waste Disposal." After Officer Economidy was involved in a fatal onduty shooting in February, 2011, a local New Mexico television station dug up his FacebookTM page. He was placed on administrative leave there and last month the Albuquerque Police Department announced a new policy to govern its officers' use of social networking sites like FacebookTM and TwitterTM.

Recently, Officer Economidy's assessment of his previous FacebookTM post was that it was "extremely inappropriate" and he considered it a "lapse in judgment on my (his) part." *New York Times, April 6, 2011.*

A careless, reckless, or intentionally false, misleading, harassing or otherwise inappropriate social networking post can not only, (law enforcement experts say,) endanger an officer's safety, but it is (in this day and age) a sure-fire way towards departmental discipline or even termination of employment.

It is an important reminder that police officers are considered police officers twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week (whether on- or off-duty)

and their behavior can be evaluated as such in a disciplinary arena at their individual police agencies.

That is, even a random, joking Facebook™ post to one's friends or family members could potentially be used later in an effort to discredit an officer, impeach an officer's testimony at trial, and/or discipline an officer internally.

In Santa Monica, California last year, the police department there went to great lengths to conceal a wounded officer's identity and location, only to have a retired officer inadvertently reveal them on Facebook™. The social networking sites may, therefore, not only become public, but may also act as catalysts for a potential plethora of job-related problems.

Because we all live in such a technologically advanced society today, it is even more important for law enforcement and corrections personnel to be cautiously wary of their interactions on social networking sites and potential videos that they could

post on random links or on such sites as YouTube™. Dialogue can be misinterpreted, posts can be misleading and such activities can potentially endanger your lives, the lives of your colleagues, and the lives of our citizens. YouTube™-type videos may only capture a fraction of an event, without giving the "full picture."

A recent Forbes.com article discussed that with more than four million registered users, FacebookTM is a "great place to find a job." Christopher Steiner and Helen Coster also noted in that article that FacebookTM is also a "great place to lose a job, too". (emphasis added).

In their article, "How Facebook Ruined my Career," Steiner and Coster indicated that commonsense is a good guide here,

but that people can be so taken by the novelty of these sites that they forget there are consequences to posting the wrong thing. They further discussed an Atlanta police officer who was recently terminated after posting sensitive information about his job on FacebookTM. Among his alleged leaks: his current cooperation with the FBI on a drug case; specific times and locations when he would be working as a plain-clothed officer; and even the fact that he was continuously frustrated at work. Though the

officer's FacebookTM account was private, that in no way stopped his department from terminating his employment. A Nebraska corrections officer allegedly mentioned on FacebookTM this past February about "smashing an inmate's face in to the ground." Soon thereafter, additional Nebraska corrections officers jumped into the FacebookTM chat to voice their support. The State of Nebraska was not impressed. All three (3) officers lost their jobs in March.

The moral of the story is this: while the fun and potential immediate gratification at social networking sites is with us even generally in life today, activity on these sites needs to be tempered with an understanding that "hitting the send button" may reach much further than just that "click of the mouse" for your law enforcement/corrections careers. Clicking "too fast" can compromise your safety. It can compromise your reputation. It can ruin your career.

I hope to establish early on a more progressive and business-like approach to our negotiations and to bridge the gaps of communication as we move forward.

Is There A Light At The End Of The Tunnel?

The year was 2008. The stock market crashed. The recession began. Our pension system lost 29 million dollars and our contract negotiations went downhill. It has been a battle every subsequent year to keep pay and benefits.

Although we presented several budget cutting ideas, the Administration repeatedly ignored them. The one event we never wanted to see were police officers being laid off. Our recommendation since 2008 has been to stop hiring and reduce the department size through attrition.

Instead, the City accepted a grant to hire more officers! They did this with the knowledge tax revenues would be on the decline until 2013.Common sense eventually prevailed. The City had to get released from the federal grant and now it is in the inevitable position of possibly having to lay off police officers.

We will do all we can to prevent this unfortunate situation, but the union can only do so much. If this Administration had worked with the union, we would not be in this situation.

Is there light at the end of the tunnel? Yes, I think there is but you will not see it for another two years. That's when property tax revenues are expected to start to rise again and the City will have fulfilled its remaining pension smoothing obligation of \$18.2 million.

We are trying to negotiate a two year contract that will take us to that date. We have packaged together a very attractive proposal to present the City that would get the step plan back and provide monies to make up the budget shortfall. We hope this will also reduce the number of (if not all) the projected layoffs.

On another note, I want to thank everyone for their input at the recent union meetings. Let's hope we can bring a contract back to you that can be ratified.

I know there are some people who do not agree with giving the City two years of 185 money totaling 2.2 million dollars, but this proposal would get the step plan back and avoid the proposed pay cuts and layoffs.

I hope this year's negotiations are a success. That would surely provide the necessary "light" in this very dark "tunnel" ahead!

School District Police News

I wanted to say thanks to all of those who voted for your School Police PBA Reps. I look forward to working with Harry and Kevin and have no doubt that we will work our hardest to get the members what they deserve. Ladies and gentleman these next couple of years belong to us. And believe me we intend to fight for our members and do what it takes to get the RESPECT that you deserve. I'm tired of hearing "Just be glad you have a job." If you are under investigation, remember, as a law enforcement officer, you have rights. They include:

 $\ensuremath{\mathbf{THE\ RIGHT}}$. . . to have a PBA representative present during an interview

 $\ensuremath{\mathbf{THE}}\ \ensuremath{\mathbf{RIGHT}}\ \dots$ to know who's in charge of the investigation

THE RIGHT . . . to know what the charges are and the name of the person bringing the charges

THE RIGHT . . . to have the interview at a reasonable time and for a reasonable length of time

THE RIGHT . . . to have any interview taperecorded from start to finish

THE RIGHT . . . not to be threatened, bribed or to have to listen to offensive language

THE RIGHT . . . not to be forced to resign

Feds Seek to Stem Rise in Officer Fatalities

WASHINGTON — Law enforcement officers are being killed at an alarming rate, Attorney General Eric Holder said on Tuesday, adding that options are being explored to address the violence, including seeking gun-control laws.

Before meeting with state and local police chiefs and representatives of federal law-enforcement agencies, Holder said 48 officers have died during the first three months of 2011, a 17 percent increase over 2010. Of those, 23 were killed by gunfire, a 53 percent jump.

Last year "really marked the deadliest year for law enforcement in nearly two decades," Holder said, noting there were 162 officers killed in 2010. "That's obviously very worrisome. This year, we're unfortunately on track to exceed the numbers we saw last year."

He said he has ordered Justice Department officials around the country to meet with law-enforcement authorities to discuss ways to address the issue, such as federal programs that provide grants to buy bulletproof vests.

After the meeting with Holder, Baltimore Police Commissioner Fred Bealefeld said he wants more federal prosecution for gun violations, noting that one of his officers was wounded in the neck Friday by a repeat offender.

"The offender that shot him was arrested in 2009 on a handgun violation, (and) only served four months of local time," he said. "One of the things I've urged is more federal intervention in prosecution of gun offenders in our jurisdiction."

Western Pennsylvania has lost six law enforcement officers in the line of duty since 2005.

Law enforcement is tough enough; we should not allow people like this to derail our progress and trample on our rights. That is a legacy we can all do without.

It is my understanding that this report is made for administrative, internal police department purposes only. This report is made by me after being ordered to do so by lawful supervisory officers. I have not been permitted a reasonable amount of time to confer with a PBA representative or attorney. It is my understanding that by refusing to obey an order to write this immediately, that I can be disciplined for insubordination and that the punishment for insubordination can be up to, and including, termination of employment. This report is made only pursuant to such orders and the potential punishment/discipline that can result for failure to obey that order.

The "Winds" of Change








n an effort to help the families of law enforcement officers who are killed or disabled in the line of duty, Florida Police Benevolent Association (PBA) has established a charitable arm which is called the PBA Heart Fund. Obesity, is it really a health risk?

ith 60% of Americans overweight, there's a good chance that you, your spouse, or a relative is one of these people. Being overweight has become so commonplace that there is the danger of this becoming the norm, rather than the exception. There are in

fact many reasons to attain and maintain a normal body weight. Obviously when we are at a normal weight we look better, but we tend to feel better. Those good feelings not only stem from feeling better about our physical appearance, but also from improving our health in general. So what are some of the associated health risks with obesity? To name a few: Heart disease, Diabetes, and Cancer; all of these being very serious and possibly even fatal conditions. Now is the time to fix this problem, before it's too late.

These are your options: 1) Accept your excess weight and hope you don't ever have health complications as a result of it; 2) Try some EASY weight loss system that only consists of pills, but has no long lasting results or benefits; 3) Find a weight loss system that considers all aspects of health and commit to doing it. Your first option is certainly the easiest, but potentially the most dangerous since in most cases of heart disease, chest pain or heart attack will be the *first* symptom a person will experience. Your second option may consist of popping some appetite suppressant pills. Sure you may lose

a few pounds, but you will pay the price afterwards. Your body doesn't like being "tricked" into thinking it had enough to eat. You may eat the wrong foods and deprive your body of vital nutrients, and as a result you will probably put on more weight than you had initially. Now your third and best option is to commit to losing weight sensibly and in a healthy way. Your body will thank you by keeping more of the weight off for much longer periods of time.

The first step is to decide how much weight you need to lose. A health professional can help you determine this number by calculating your BMI (Body Mass Index). Next you need to determine a healthy plan to lose the weight which should consist of reducing caloric intake by meal replacement and eliminating fried foods. Exercise should be implemented into your daily routine, but most important, you need to implement a "can do" attitude and stick with it until you reach your goal. Nobody said it should be easy, but the end result is well worth the struggle!

Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics 2011

n Wednesday, April 13, 2011, the annual Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics traveled through Palm Beach County. Each year the Torch travels throughout the state, escorted by law enforcement personnel, for about a month prior to arriving at the Special Olympics State Games opening ceremony; this year the State Games opened on May 13th in Orlando at Disney's Wide World of Sports facility. The Law Enforcement Torch Run and related fund raising events held in Florida raise money to support Special Olympics athletes and their families with participation and travel costs affiliated with competing in various sporting events throughout the year. Without financial support, the number of athletes competing would diminish drastically as the costs can be overwhelming for some families. The officers in Palm Beach County consistently raise about twenty thousand dollars each year through tee shirt and hat sales, donations (FOP and PBA have been very supportive of this cause), and special events such as this year's "Tip-a-Cop" events which were hosted by Duffy's Restaurants in Palm Beach Gardens and Royal Palm Beach.

The two "Tip-a-Cop" events where members of several local agencies worked as celebrity waiters and waitresses to earn "tips" for Special Olympics resulted in over \$4000 in donations in about four hours on March 31st. There were members from twelve different agencies that joined together to work these events alongside several local Special Olympic athletes who

came out to help. Everyone had a great time and we got a lot of great feedback from the community for the work all of the local law enforcement agencies do; it is always nice to hear the positive comments about the efforts of the officers and this event proved there are many officers willing to get involved in helping people, over and beyond their normal work duties.

The Torch Run itself was a great success this year with an apparent record number of participants. There were about two hundred runners and about the same number of escorts (motorcycles, marked patrol cars, Command post vehicles, SWAT team vehicles, Segways, and bicycles) involved in the 5.5 mile run from Lantana Beach to Royal Palm School. Chief Chris Yannuzzi (Ocean Ridge), Chief Dan Alexander (Boca Raton) and Chief Delsa Bush (West Palm Beach) all put on their running shoes and participated in the run this year which ended at the Royal Palm School where the officers mingled with all the special needs students who attend the school. There was a quick continental breakfast reception, hosted in part by a WPB PBA donation, after the run to recognize and say thanks to all the officers who participated in this special event. It is truly awe-inspiring to see how many people are willing to volunteer to participate in this event each year. As it is an annual event, there is an open invitation to everyone to participate next year. If you have any doubt about the cause or the event, just ask anyone who has participated in it and you will quickly learn the personal benefits of becoming a part of it.

- ✓ to be interrogated at a reasonable hour (e.g., at a time when a PBA attorney can be present for the review and interrogation);



- ✓ to refuse a polygraph, and
- ✓ to refuse to respond to questions if an investigator intentionally fails to comply with requested requirements after being advised of his or her violations of those requirements.

As a dues-paying member, a Palm Beach County PBA attorney can be with you every step of the way.

ATTENTION: RETIREES

Please take notice that pursuant to §95.11(3), Florida Statutes, lawsuits, including "an action founded on negligence," and "for assault, battery, false arrest, false imprisonment, or any other intentional tort..." must be filed "WITHIN FOUR YEARS" of the incident date.

To the extent that such lawsuits may be brought against you *after* you retire, you need to consider continuing your membership for four (4) years beyond your retirement.

If you are retired but have returned to law enforcement and are currently paying a "RETIREE MEMBER-SHIP," you should be aware that if you are subject to such actions at a time when you no longer are paying the appropriate dues, the PBA cannot provide legal assistance. See Palm Beach County Policy 12-1.

Enjoy the full peace of mind your retirement should mean.

REMINDER

The legal defense policies of the Florida and Palm Beach County PBA have an important provision regarding representation. If a member elects to secure representation by anyone other than the PBA (a private attorney, for example) that member is considered to have waived representation by the PBA. Once this happens, it is the PBA's option whether or not to continue to represent the member in that matter. Please call the PBA office if you have any questions regarding this policy.

817.311 UNLAWFUL USE OF BADGES, ETC.

(1) (817.311 SS)From and after May 9, 1949, any person who shall wear or display a badge, button, insignia or other emblem, or shall use the name of or claim to be a member of any benevolent, fraternal, social, humane, or charitable organization, which organization is entitled to the exclusive use of such name and such badge, button, insignia or emblem either in the identical form or in such near resemblance thereto as to be a colorable imitation thereof, unless such person is entitled so to do under the laws, rules and regulations of such organization, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in S. 775.082 or S. 775.083.

(2) This section shall be cumulative to any and all laws now in force in the state.

PLEASE NOTE

843.085 Unlawful Use of police badges or other indicia of authority: (l) Unless appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter 354, authorized by the appropriate agency, or displayed in a closed or mounted case as a collection or exhibit, to wear or display any authorized indicia of authority, including any badge, insignia, emblem, identification card, or uniform, or any colorable imitation thereof, of any federal, state, county, or municipal law enforcement agency, or other criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in S. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it, or which displays in any manner or combination the word or words "police," "patrolman," "agent," "sheriff," "deputy," "trooper," "highway patrol," "Wildlife Officer," "Marine Patrol Officer," "state attorney," "public defender," "marshal," "constable," or "bailiff," which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it.

(2) To own or operate a motor vehicle marked or identified in any manner or combination by the word or words "police," (etc.) Or by any lettering, marking, or insignia, or colorable imitation thereof, including but not limited to, stars, badges, or shields, officially used to identify the vehicle as a federal, state, county or municipal law enforcement vehicle or a vehicle used by a criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in s. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such vehicle is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person operating the motor vehicle, unless such vehicle is owned or operated by the appropriate agency and its use is authorized by such agency, or the local law enforcement agency authorizes the use of such vehicle or unless the person is appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter

(4) NOTHING IN THIS SECTION SHALL PROHIBIT A FRATER-NAL, BENEVOLENT, OR LABOR ORGANIZATION OR ASSOCIATION, OR THEIR CHAPTERS OR SUBSIDIARIES, FROM USING THE FOLLOWING WORDS, IN ANY MANNER OR IN ANY COMBINATION, IF THOSE WORDS APPEAR IN THE OFFICIAL NAME OF THE ORGANIZATIONS OR ASSOCIATIONS.

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
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
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
